

2006	Sonora/Woodley Park	Split event, north at OGTS, south at the All-GM show
2010	Laguna Seca Raceway	The car show was held in an Opel Corral, plus we had ring-side seats on the hill below the cork-screw where breakfast was served while we watched the races.

The Bodega Bay Loop


The following is one of the tours were are planning for the 2015 meet. This route takes you a few miles south of Rohnert Park before turning west towards the coast. The loop starts out on rural roads in some of Sonoma County's most scenic dairy and wine country, passing by town of Bodega, probably best known for the church used in scene in Alfred Hitchcock's film *The Birds*, and finally bringing you to the coast and the small town of Bodega Bay.

Our loop continues north on the Pacific Coast Highway. There are many places along this road to pull over to take in the scenery, breath in the fresh sea air, and even go down to the beach.

A few miles later we turn east again and follow the Russian River to Geurneville, a former logging town whose success in that endeavor earned it the name "Stumptotwn". If you like you can take a side-trip to see the redwoods in the Armstrong Redwoods State Natural

Reserve. The "big one" there is 310 feet tall and an estimated 1,400 years old.

All along this route are interesting places to stop and visit. Just after turning off 116, heading south, is the Washoe House, a hotel that has been in continuous operation since 1859. The ceiling in the restaurant has to be seen. In Valley Ford there is a woolen shop (locally-produced wool, knitting, local art) and a restaurant well known for its mussels. Geurneville, long ago a logging town and later adopted then abandoned by leisure seekers from San Francisco once inexpensive airlines could whisk them off to more exotic places, is now a mix of traditional and counter-cultures that results in an interesting local arts scene. This tour, and others we are working on, allow plenty of time for stops like these.



The Sonoma Hills Loop

Keith Ory knows this area well, it's practically his back yard, and he put together a tour of the Sonoma hills for us. If you liked the Bodega loop tour you'll love this one. It offers a more "inland" view of Sonoma and includes at least one stop at a winery. By at least one, the meaning here is that there are many along this route and no doubt people will be breaking off from the group to visit a few more.

The tour starts by heading north on Hwy-101 to Fulton where it turns towards the Mayacamas Mountains. Offering rolling hills and a mix of forested and open land through farms and vineyards, this will be a very nice way to put 15 or so miles on your Opel.


We regroup on the western edge of Calistoga before cruising through town and heading south, following the Napa River and skirting the eastern edge of the Napa Valley. There are many picturesque wineries all along this section of the route and no one would blame you for splitting off to spend some time at one, or more.

The drive through this section is leisurely, certainly not

the hilly like before Calistoga. We pass by the edge of Saint Helena and continue towards the city of Napa, but not driving through it. Just south of Napa we turn west on Hwy-12, then onto Hwy-121, which would take you to Sonoma Raceway except Keith has us detour to the tiny town of Vineburg where we turn north and head from the Buena Vista Vinery for a visit.

The final segment has us heading south through Vineburg again and turning west to take the back roads to Petaluma. From there is it a short sprint back to the hotel. Or, you can run the loop in the other direction. Just make sure to get back in time for dinner.

After this tour is over we can discuss dinner, and we've already got a short list of favorites that we're sure you'll like. We'll let the group decide where we want to eat, and where we want to go after dinner.



The Dinner Map

We offer two routes, the quick one, and the back roads route. Of course, quick depends on traffic, and Hwy-101 can get pretty slow.


The Quick Route (Red)

- 1. After leaving the hotel and traveling south on DoubleTree Drive, turn right onto Golf Course Way, heading towards Hwy-101.
- 2. Get on Hwy-101 heading north. This is the most direct route to Santa Rosa, although early evening weekend traffic can really slow things down.
- 3. Take exit 489 onto 3rd Street and head east.
- 4. Follow 3rd Street for 7 blocks. At this point 3rd Street will become Montgomery Road.
- 5. Follow Montgomery Road until you get to Hwy-12. At this point you've joined the back roads route, so skip to step 7 for further instructions.

The Back Roads Route (Blue)

- 1. After leaving the hotel and traveling south on DoubleTree Drive, turn left onto Golf Course Way, heading away from Hwy-101.
- 2. After about a mile turn north (left) onto Snyder Lane.
- 3. In just over a half mile Snyder Lane ends in Petaluma Hill Road. Turn left onto Petaluma Hill Road and follow it north for about 3 miles.
- 4. Petaluma Hill Road ends at Santa Rosa Avenue. Turn right and about a block later turn right again onto Bennet Valley Road.
- 5. Bennet Valley Road will follow Hwy-12 for a while then will curve south. After the curve start looking for Farmers Lane and take it, turning left and heading north.
- 6. Soon Farmers Lane will become Hwy-12. Follow it for almost a mile until you get to Montgomery Road. Turn right onto Montgomery Road and follow it for about a mile.

- 7. Turn left onto Spaletta Road, which may be difficult to see. It actually looks more like a driveway than a street. Anyway, it will take you into the parking lot of the restaurant. By the way, the restaurant is impossible to see from the Montgomery Road due to the trees, but there is a green and white sign on your left to help you find Spaletta Road and the restaurant.
- 8. If you go as far as Shadow Lane/Summerfield Road you have missed the restaurant and more than likely we have started eating your food.

About the Region

Sonoma Wine Country

Sonoma Valley is located in southeastern Sonoma County, California, in the San Francisco Bay Area. Known as the birthplace of the California wine industry, the valley is home to some of the earliest vineyards and wineries in the state, some of which survived the phylloxera epidemic of the 1870s and the impact of prohibition in the early 20th century.

The valley's original inhabitants were the coastal Miwok, Pomo and Wintun peoples, who called their home the "Valley of the Moon". Eventually the Spanish arrived with plans to build the northern most mission, Mission San Francisco Solano, in Alta California, and it was soon built by the newly independent Mexico in 1823. During this time the indigenous societies of the region were dispossessed of their land and decimated by diseases to which Europeans were resistant. Soon after the Sonoma mission was built el Pueblo de Sonoma (the town of Sonoma) was laid out in the standard form of a Mexican town.

Sonoma was also at the center of the Bear Flag Republic, essentially an independent nation carved out of Mexican territory in 1846 by 24 men, among them Kit Carson, and which lasted only 26 days before the US Navy stepped in. After California entered the union in 1850 former Mexican general and wealthy land owner Mariano Vallejo guided the development of the town and dispensed large ranches throughout the valley. California's first wineries were established here, including Buena Vista Winery (1857) and Gundlach Bundschu (1858).

Today Sonoma County is home to more than 400 wineries, miles of rugged Pacific coastline, towering redwood forests, hot springs, and is not far from San Francisco's Golden Gate Bridge. It also boasts more than 50 pristine nature parks that offer travelers miles of hiking and cycling trails through the towering redwoods or oak-studded hills. Rivers entice visitors to kayak, canoe, or simply float along the cool waters.

Bodega Bay

This town of just over 1,000 people dates back to the time (1809) when Russians were building settlements in California. This harbor town served as a port that supported Fort Ross and the larger Russian community known as Colony Ross. *Source -wikipedia*

Scenes from the 1963 Hitchcock film "The Birds" were filmed in Bodega Bay, although the famous church scene was filmed in nearby Bodega.

The harbor itself is quite active, literally. During the 1908 earthquake one section of it moved north 15 feet. The San Andreas fault passes right through the harbor. It makes you wonder why Pacific Gas & Electric wanted to build a nuclear power plant there in the 1960s. *HomeFacts* reports there have been 27,762 earthquakes there since 1931, so no wonder they rate home ownership in Bodega Bay as being a tad risky.



Armstrong Redwoods State Park

The tallest tree stands at 310 feet (94m) and the oldest tree is over 1,400 years old. Given the amount of logging done in the area around Guerneville it's amazing these trees still exist. We can thank Colonel James Armstrong who in 1870 set aside this land as a botanical garden.

As California redwood forests go, this is a small one, and probably the southern-most one, but it is very nice and a walk or drive through it does given you a sense of something ancient.

Sonoma Raceway

This year marks 46 years of historic racing action in the Sonoma Valley. Opened in 1968, then-Sears Point Raceway, was constructed on 720 acres of property that was a working dairy farm in the early 1900s. The facility hosted its first official event, an SCCA Enduro, on Dec. 1 of that year. Since then, the facility has grown to 1,600 acres and expanded into one of the premier motor sports venues in the country, hosting 340 days of racing activity each year, including the NASCAR Sprint Cup Series, NHRA Full Throttle Drag Racing and the IZOD IndyCar Series. *Source – http://www.racesonoma.com*

A number of Opelers have raced at this track, including Roger Lee, Mike Meier, Alan Brattesani, Zep Brattesani, Robert Ferris, and no doubt others whose names are buried in past issues of *The Blitz*.

Point Reyes National Seashore

This 70,000 square mile nature preserve is located just north of San Francisco. On the map it is very distinctive. It's that triangle of land that seems to be splitting off from North America. That because it is. It is on the Pacific plate, the San Andreas fault marking the boundary between the two.

This is a wonderful place to visit and Drake's Bay, where some believe Sir Charles Drake landed, can be quite beautiful. Not far away is the point Reyes Lighthouse, first lit in 1870 and still operating. The light flashes every 5 seconds and can been seen 20 miles out to sea.

Stinson Beach

Stinson Beach is another small coastal California town that got it's start in the latter part of the 18th century. It

started out as a camp, then it got a railroad station, and after the 1906 earthquake refugees that moved there built some of its first businesses. The beach itself is long and wide and sandy, but the water is cold, typical of northern California. It is located on Hwy-1 so it gets a lot of tourists driving the coastal highway, and so of course it is a nice place to stop and get some seafood.

Tennessee Valley

The Tennessee Valley includes a few ranches and homes and a state park. The park is a favorite hiking area that can take you to the ocean at Tennessee Cove or over the hills to Muir Beach. Tennessee Valley and Cove were named after the steamer that ran aground there in 1853. Parts of the ship still protrude from the gravely beach. Above the cove is a bunker built during World War II.

There is plenty of wildlife to be seen along the 1.8 mile walk to the cove. Deer are plentiful, and once a friend and I encountered a mountain lion who had been next to the road watching people walk past. Once this skittish cat had been spotted it ran back up the hill and disappeared.

Geology

While touring the area around Bodega Bay take a moment to contemplate the geology of this place. The rock, a malange created during crustal subduction, includes both oceanic and continental crust as well as granite from (possibly) Baja, over a thousand miles to the south. The gently sloping land was once a sea bed, uplifted and tilted towards the west where it is being eaten away by the ocean. Like much of California this region is seismically active. During the 1906 earthquake part of the Bodega harbor moved north 15 feet. By the way, the San Andreas Fault is less than 2 miles to the west so hold on to your coffee in case it awakens.
